Overview

The Palestinian Anti-Corruption Commission and the Ministry of Health in Palestine are collaborating with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) to institutionalize Sectoral Corruption Risk Management. This partnership aims to enhance governance integrity in the health sector, ensuring it can effectively deliver services that contribute to the Sustainable Development Goals, particularly SDG 3 on good health and well-being, and SDG 16 on peace, justice, and strong institutions.

As an initial step, UNDP held a specialized training session in Amman, Jordan (7-9 May 2023), attended by representatives of the Palestinian Anti-Corruption Commission, the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Finance, the Financial and Administrative Audit Bureau, and international experts. The training covered anti-corruption efforts in Palestine, focusing on the health sector, and introduced UNDP's Sectoral Corruption Risk Management methodology through practical exercises. It concluded with a discussion on best practices and implementation steps.

Following the training, the head of the Palestinian Anti-Corruption Commission (PACC) issued a decision establishing a task force to assess corruption risks across various sectors. Additionally, the Minister of Health formed a task force within the Ministry, comprising representatives from different departments, to assess and manage corruption risks.

To advance the implementation of the sectoral corruption risk management initiative, the UNDP is organizing a specialized training for the health sector "Sectoral Corruption Risk Management in the Health Sector of Palestine." It will take place between 26-28 July 2024, in Amman, Jordan and is jointly supported by the UNDP Programme of Assistance to the Palestinian People and the regional project Anti-Corruption and Integrity in Arab Countries (ACIAC), which is implemented in partnership with the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA).

The training aims to equip the task force with a comprehensive understanding of UNDP's Sectoral Corruption Risk Management methodology and its application in Palestine's health sector. It will emphasize practical implementation, leveraging experiences from other Arab countries. UNDP experts will also review the task team's corruption risk assessment outcomes and conclude the session with an action plan outlining next steps and support needs.
